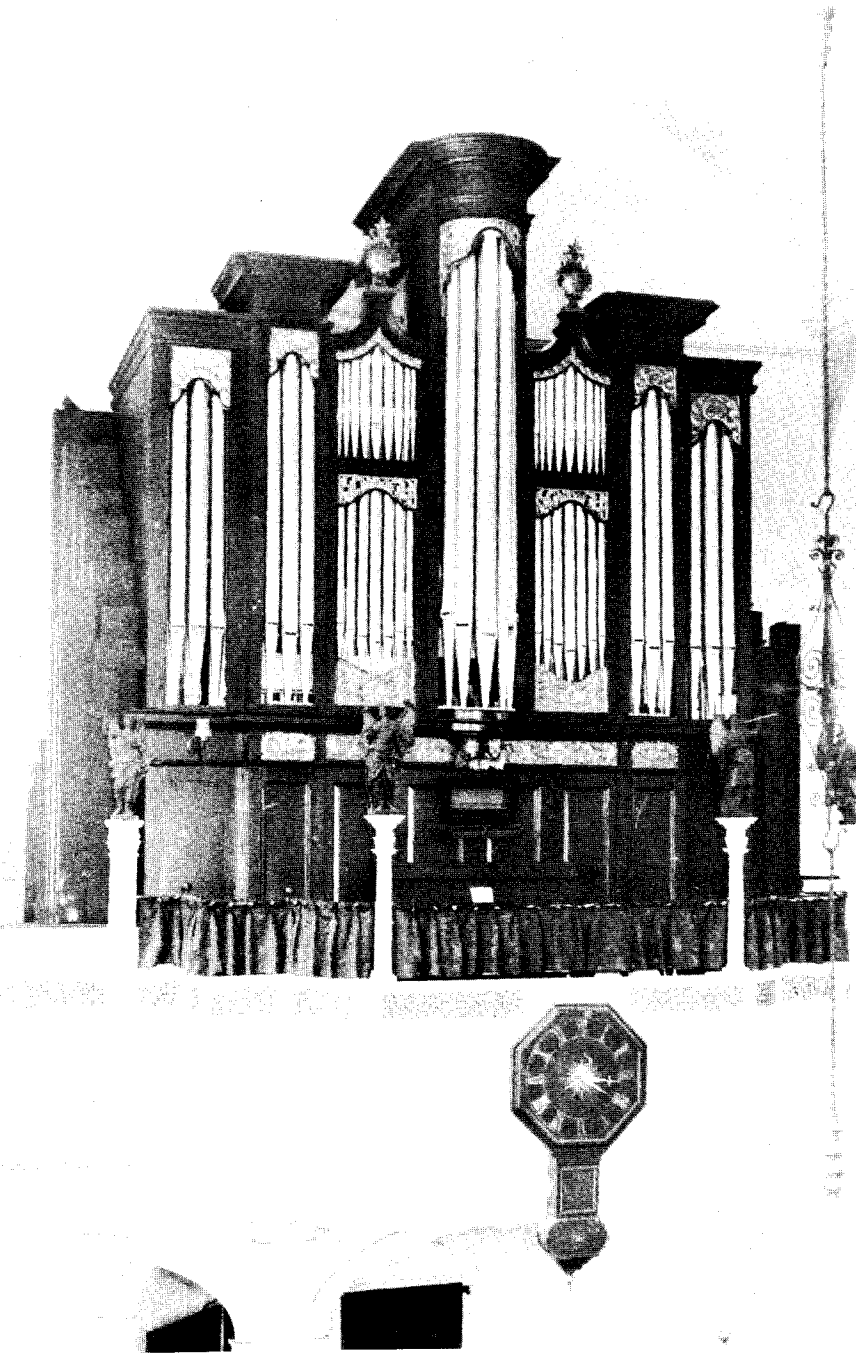

The case of the organ is the original case of the Johnston Organ of 1759. A number of the gilded Open Diapason pipes in the case speak once again and are Johnston pipes, which are some 200 years old.

Several ranks, especially on the Great Organ, are believed to be from the 1821 Goodrich installation. The condition of the pipes and the specification would indicate this may be true.

The mechanical (or tracker) key action was retained when the organ was completely rebuilt, during 1958. At that time, the stop action was made electro-pneumatic, so that it was possible to incorporate combination pistons.

Edward B. Gammons was consultant for the 1958 rebuilding. The revised specification was designed by Herman L. Schlicker, in cooperation with E. Power Biggs and Mr. Gammons.
